Reel talent in spotlight

Indigenous creatives set to shine for Ngawan Short and Deadly Film Festival

INDIGENOUS students in Sunbury, and beyond, are set to revel in their creativity on September 14, at the Ngawan Short and Deadly Film Festival.

About a dozen short films will be screened at the event at Readings Sunbury, from 6.30-8.30pm.

Sunbury Community Health Aboriginal community partnership and engagement officer Gail Radford said the films gave about a dozen students from as young as six the opportunity to write, film and edit their own stories.

Helping them was indigen-

ous filmmaker, Richard Frankland, and his team from the Wilin Centre for Indigenous Arts and Cultural Development.

“There was some really brilliant work done,” Ms Radford said.

A highlight of the event is a traditional dance by Aborigi-

nal students from Craigieburn Secondary College.

The films were shot during two workshops at Sunbury Neighbourhood House.
